





Safety instructions for the sailors

In case of emergency

Do in the following order and proceed to the next action if unsuccessful

- 1. Call the Safety Officer and clearly express that you are in distress. The Safety Officer will immediately launch a rescue operation and call the JRCC for assistance.
- 2. Dial 112 to connect to JRCC (Swedish Maritime Administration)
- 3. Issue a Mayday on channel 16.
- 4. If/when appropriate, deploy your parachute flare

A sailor that has lost contact with the F18 and can't get back, nor to shore Mobile connection available;

- send your position (Long/Lat) to Safety Officer then call the Safety Officer No mobile connection available
 - Activate your PLB.
 - Deploy your electronic flare and/or use a signal mirror (during sunlight)

<u>In need of assistance</u> (not in distress)

Call the Safety Officer

- 1. On mobile phone or
- 2. On VHF channel 72

Outside assistance

Please note that requesting outside assistance will result in a DNF for that leg. The only exception is if a person in the water is picked up and returned to the F18 boat which does not count as outside assistance.







Safety plan for the race organisation

Version 1.0

General

- All safety boats must have at least two qualified operators onboard.
- Ensure personal safety by moving cautiously at all times.
- Constantly monitor your crew members.
- Be prepared to assist participants both in the water and on boats at all times.
- Each boat will be equipped with a laminated version of this plan, a contact list, a participant list and a Check Point list.
- A comprehensive first aid kit will be available on the Safety Officer's boat. If you are certified in first aid, please inform the Safety Officer.

Communication

- Every safety boat should carry at least one VHF radio and a telephone.
- The Safety Officer is always reachable via phone first.
- Ensure a communication list is present on each boat.

Safety onboard

- An effective crew member must be well-prepared and adaptable to changing weather conditions. Anticipate and plan for weather changes.
- Always wear a life jacket and keep a knife, flare, and first aid kit readily accessible.
- Maintain an orderly ship and ensure equipment is easily accessible.
- Always notify the Safety Officer if a team reports a problem. The Safety Officer will determine the appropriate action.
- SAR operations can take up to 3 hours; check that fuel levels are no less than 50% and if so look for nearest place to re-fuel.
- Create a checklist for emergency scenarios such as leaks, fires, or engine problems.
- In the event of engine failure, the race will not stop; be prepared with extra food, water, and a credit card.

Assisting an F18 crew

- In case of emergency help immediately without asking for consent.
- If asked to help in other non-emergency situations, make sure that the team is requesting assistance even if it might result in a DNF for that leg.
- Picking up a person from the water and return to the F18 boat is not seen as outside assistance and will not cause a DNF.
- When assisting a capsized boat, ensure the righting line is at least 15 m long to avoid that the mast top hit the boat if the boat flip over to the other side. It is safest to right the boat against the wind.
